

MCW Well Represented at 1st International Conference on the Prevention of Infection

Constantine T. Frantzides, M.D., Ph.D. and Charles E. Edmiston, Ph.D. represented the Department of Surgery of The Medical College of Wisconsin at the First International Conference on the Prevention of Infection, which was held May 2-4 in Nice, France.

The conference was divided into four main program topics: community-acquired infection; hospital hygiene and public health; internal medicine, pediatrics and intensive care; and surgery. Each program provided a variety of subjects. Drs. Frantzides and Edmiston were each the principal author of a presented paper on the surgery program.

Dr. Frantzides spoke on "Microbial Overgrowth in Diabetic Small Bowel," and Dr. Edmiston on "Biomaterial-Associated Infections: Antimicrobial."
